Paramus Catholic had no answers as BC raced from Round 2 into the NJSIAA Semifinals.



A thirty-five-minute lull fell over the Crusader who saw the Paladins score a goal before the end of the first half as BC did not score at all.

The 12-2 Crusaders opened the flood gates in the second half as they eliminated the winless Paladins and advanced in the playoff. Sweeney finished with the hat trick and 2 assists while Sapontzis recorded a second had goal and finished with 4 assists. Brian Dipalma scored a

# **REMINDER: Restrictions on Interstate Indoor Sports Competitions -**

- All interstate games and tournaments involving indoor sports, up to and including the high school level, will be prohibited.
- 2. Collegiate and professional sports will be unaffected.

# BIRD OF THE WEEK & MORE MILESTONE EDITION

November 21 – North Arlington, NJ – The day was planned perfectly. Birding with Br. Fagan and the Bergen County Audubon group in Harrier Meadows, followed by Bergen Football vs. Delbarton. Then to the couch to watch Mike Bajakian '91, offensive coordinator of Northwestern to help his team continue toward an undefeated season and finally, watching Johnny Langan '18, Brian Felter '20 and former BC Head Coach, Nunzio Campanile help Rutgers hopefully defeat Michigan. No offense to the Wolverines' Jordan Morant '20. We really want to see you do well also!!!

It really started off well as Brother and I picked up a life bird on the trails. A life bird or "lifer" is a bird that you encounter (see or hear) in person for the first time. For Br. Fagan, the Common Redpoll is bird #579 on his life list. For me, #400, a milestone bird.

Murphy's Law prevails and the bird chose not to be

photogenic, but you may notice this finch-like bird has a small yellowish-

conical bill. There is a tiny ruby swatch on the crown. This



bird is a female bird as it lacked the "pink wash" on its breast that the males have. These females also have heavy streaking underneath on the sides, as shown above.

Redpolls are seed eaters and pick from willow, birch, alder and spruce trees as well as grasses and wildflowers.

These birds breed in the arctic and year-round live throughout Canada and the northern US. They scarcely winter in Jersey and that Route 70-Route 80 cross-country path, but it's 2020. Why shouldn't this year be weird in birding terms?
